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Tuition and Billing

Tuition Information

Tuition rates for 2023 are \$450 per credit hour. Registration links will be provided via email.

<u>Principles of Voice Production (3 Credits)</u>	\$1,350	(Registration deadline: May 29)
<u>Instrumentation and Analysis (2 Credits)</u>	\$900	(Registration deadline: June 20)
<u>Voice Habilitation (2 Credits)</u>	\$900	(Registration deadline: June 24)
<u>Voice for Performers (2 Credits)</u>	\$900	(Registration deadline: July 8)

Billing and Payment Information

Tuition is due upon registration for the courses through the University of Utah Continuing Education department. A direct link will be provided by the SVI coordinator to register for each course, to complete the registration, you will be required to pay via credit card. You must be registered for the courses by the end of day on the deadlines listed above. The only exception to this is scholarship recipients, who will be provided a unique link after general registration ends for the class for which they are applying their scholarship funds.

It is recommended that you have reviewed these texts prior to arrival in Salt Lake City as the day to day pace of the courses-particularly Block 1- is very fast.

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Housing Options

On Campus Housing

Benchmark Apartments, are part of the Heritage Commons housing complex, located on the North East corner of campus within historic Fort Douglas. SVI has an allotment of 12 rooms at during the date range of June 4, 2023, through July 20, 2023.

Benchmark apartment allotment consists of 3- and 4-bedroom apartments. Each apartment features a full kitchen, individual bedrooms, and a living space to share with fellow students/interns in the same program. For a list of specific amenities, click the Info link below. Be aware that campus is alcohol-free and smoke-free. Alcohol and smoking are not allowed on campus.

Benchmark is located within walking distance to the TRAX light rail system, which provides easy access to other parts of campus, downtown Salt Lake City, and the Airport. There is a shuttle stop that serves the university campus that has a stop at Heritage Commons. "HU" Parking Permits can be purchased to keep a car in the housing lot near the apartment complex.

Meldrum House One-Bedroom Apartments, are owned by Pioneer Theatre Company. Recently renovated, the apartments are used to house traveling artist in PTC productions August through May. The historic building is located just one block west of the campus border. These fully furnished apartments include linens, all kitchen supplies, tv, cable, wifi. Pay laundry is available on-site. Alcohol is allowed in the building. Parking is not available on-site. City street parking is free within a two block walk, or you can get a campus parking permit and keep your car in a lot approximately three blocks south near the Trax station.

Off Campus Housing

If you wish to coordinate your own housing off campus, using Air BNB or other online service, you will want to be aware of the location and distance to campus. Blocks in Salt Lake City are longer than in some other cities, so use mapping technology to plan the walking times/distances to make sure an off-campus location is a good fit for you. Also, be aware that Salt Lake City has ordinances prohibiting "Short Term" rentals via AirBNB/VRBO. They define short term as "less than 30 days". While you can search for them and book them, if the city learns of the violation the owner will be fined and you may lose your housing. The only exception to this is if you rent a room in an owner-occupied home.

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Preparing For SVI

Math Review

The first block, Principles of Voice Production, is very math and science oriented, so it would be a good idea to review your math skills (particularly math used in physics: algebra and calculus). You can find a basic math review on our web site at: https://vocology.utah.edu/svi/math_review.php. Please note that this is not an extensive review, and regular coursework will go beyond the methods reviewed here.

Do the best you can in solving the problems on this review. The answers are at the end of the packet. If you need help with a problem, read over the review slides. If you can solve most of these problems with the assistance of the review slides, you should be well prepared for the class.

What to Bring – The High Desert Climate

It is hot in the summers in Utah so bring light-weight clothing. It is very dry and sunny so sunglasses, sunscreen and shady hats are a must to protect you from the higher-elevation rays. However, we are also classified as “high desert” so evenings or early mornings can sometimes be cool—especially if adventuring in the higher altitudes on your days off. The class rooms are air-conditioned and can be cool so, if you prefer a light jacket, please pack one. There is no dress code for class so bring clothes you will be comfortable in.

It is also a good idea to bring one dressier outfit if you are staying for course 4 for the [SVI Concert](#) and graduation banquet. There are numerous hiking spots that connect to some campus as well as all around Salt Lake so bring hiking clothes/shoes if that interests you. We will sponsor at least one group [hike](#) for those interested. More local and regional activities are listed later in this handbook.

Please stay well-hydrated. We realize that we are preaching to the choir of voice specialists, here—but we still have to say it. Bring a water bottle with you each day. The altitude alone is drying and add to that our dry-heat and visitors who are not yet acclimated can end up with nose-bleeds and headaches.

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International Students

Overview

All international students must get a student visa to study in the United States. If you have not already, you will need to start the Visa application process as soon as possible. For more information about how to obtain, please contact us svi@utah.edu.

Documentation

As soon as possible upon your arrival in Salt Lake City, International Student Services requires that you “Report Your Arrival”. The instructions on how to complete the Arrival Report e-form will be included in your welcome packet that you will receive in the mail with your DS-2019 paperwork.

- Be sure to have the SVI Coordinator (Angie Keeton) listed on your form as your department contact (email: svi@utah.edu)
- In your arrival report, you will need to submit the following information to activate your immigration record:
 - Passport
 - J-1 Visa
 - I-94 (issued when you enter the US)-You will be able to access this online
 - DS-2019 to show the stamp from the consular officer.
 - Proof of health insurance coverage
 - Provide the local address and a phone number you can be reached at while you are here.

International Student Resources

The SVI Coordinator will work with you on your J-1 Visa applications. The fee to apply is \$350. Our office will cover the fee at first to get the process started. However, international students are now responsible for reimbursing our office for this fee. A payment link will be provided prior to the start of the program.

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Transportation

Airport Shuttle

If you are coming via the airport, we recommend using the Xpress Shuttle. It is \$35 one way per person for a shared ride when going to /from the University of Utah from the airport. For more information, visit their website at <https://expressshuttleutah.com/> or call at 801.596.1600.

Alternatively, Trax is our SLC light rail system and you can arrive on campus with one transfer from the green line to the red line (in the direction of University Medical Center). From the airport, rideshare like Uber and Lyft and Taxis are also available and you may consider shared transportation with classmates when you depart since many will leave the same day.

Parking Fees

If you plan on driving to class and need to park your car anywhere on campus, you are required to get a summer parking pass (just under \$100 in 2024) or pay hourly visitor rates of \$3/hr or \$30/day. Paid hourly visitor spots are active M-F 7am-8pm. Please check [online](#) for current prices on parking permits and to see where the lots are located for specific permits. You will need your UNID (student ID number) to login to the portal to purchase your permit. You will receive your UNID from the SVI Administrator no later than May 1. Public Transportation (On and Off Campus)

SVI WELCOME POTLUCK DINNER

This is a small gathering at Dr. Ingo Titze's home. It is for the Summer Vocology Institute students and teachers, along with those who work at UCV/SVI and takes place on a Saturday during Principles of Voice Production. If you have family in town with you, they may also attend. This gives students the opportunity to get to know the teachers outside of the classroom. A hike to nearby Ensign Peak is a pre-dinner option. The evening always involves good food, lawn games and impromptu music performances, stunning views, and even better company!

Graduation Dinner, Certificate Ceremony and SVI Concert

Our Graduation Ceremony and Concert has always been one of the biggest the highlights of SVI. It takes place in the third block the evening before the last class. The concert is put on by any SVI students who would like to share their talents. The program usually involves singing and poetry readings, but can include other talents as well. It is a great way to celebrate all you have accomplished together over the summer. You can check out pictures from past concerts on our Facebook page.

SVI Hike

Every year we try to offer at least one SVI coordinated group outing. In the past, we have hiked to the Timpanogos Caves and to Ensign Peak. If you would like to participate, please bring appropriate shoes and clothing. *(Date for 2023 Timpanogos hike is likely July 7. This is a day trip and will require a reservation and a \$12 ticket fee. A sign up sheet and payment process will be coordinated by the SVI Administrator).*

For self-guided hikes at other times, we recommend downloading an app like AllTrails to see all that the Wasatch mountains and Salt Lake area trail systems have to offer.

Sites to See in and Around Salt Lake City

There are no classes on the weekends. If you have free time, you are encouraged to explore around Salt Lake City. Listed here are a few of the most popular sites to see. Most are located downtown and are easy to get to by Trax, bus, and/or walking. Click on the name of the site to visit their website. We hope you enjoy exploring all that Salt Lake City has to offer!

Free

Memory Grove Park:

This park not only commemorates Utah's veterans, but it extends into the northeast mountains along City Creek and is perfect for walking or jogging.

Liberty Park:

The park comprises of tennis courts, paddle boats, and walking/running paths. Concerts are also held here in the summer.

Pioneer Memorial Museum:

This Museum teaches about and pays tribute to those who founded Utah.

The Gateway:

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This is Salt Lake City's premier shopping and dining center. It includes many shops, restaurants, a movie theatre, and the Discovery Gateway Children's Museum.

City Creek Center:

This is Salt Lake City's newest premier shopping center, which opened in March of 2012. Conveniently located in the heart of Salt Lake City, right off of the City Center Trax Station it houses restaurants and high-end stores (such as Michael Kors, Pandora, Nordstrom, and Tiffany & Co.). Features an indoor fish pond, creek and retractable roof.

The Clark Planetarium:

Located in the Gateway, the Clark Planetarium includes free exhibits and shows. The shows can be viewed in the 5-story high IMAX theatre or in the 360 degree Hansen Dome Theatre. Current movie, light show, and scientific show times can be found on their website (tickets for shows range from \$6-\$8).

Temple Square:

Owned by the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints, temple square offers many sights and sounds you don't want to miss, including listening to the music of the world-famous Tabernacle Choir at Temple Square, touring the conference center, visiting the family history center, and enjoying the gardens surrounding the Salt Lake Temple.

For those who are musically inclined, you would enjoy Music and the Spoken Word. It is a free half hour concert put on by the Mormon Tabernacle Choir and the Orchestra at Temple Square every Sunday morning at 9:30.

Cathedral of the Madeleine:

Built in 1901, this Rhenish Gothic-styled Cathedral. Here they hold several concerts, all part of the Madeleine Festival of the Arts and Humanities. It is also close to many other historical sites.

This is the Place Heritage Park:

History and heritage surround you at This Is the Place Heritage Park. The Heritage Village is open each day from 9:00 am to 5:00 pm, Monday through Saturday; enjoy all the Park has to offer: pony rides, the Native American Village, artisan trade demonstrations, and much more. Each Sunday you can enjoy a historic tour on one of our three replica trains and a self-guided tour through the park. All the natural beauty comes free of charge!

Red Butte Garden:

Utah Museum of National History:

Part of the University of Utah, this garden includes over 100 acres of gardens, walking paths, and is one of the largest botanical gardens in the Intermountain West (\$16 for adults).

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Located on the University of Utah campus, this museum displays Utah's collection of archeological finds including dinosaur fossils and Utah's first humans (\$22.95 for adults).

Utah Museum of Fine Arts:

Also located on University of Utah Campus, this museum provides a gateway to world art and culture. You can walk through or take a tour of the collections highlights (\$17.95 for adults).

Utah's Hogle Zoo:

The Hogle Zoo is a Utah treasure. Located at the mouth of Emigration Canyon since 1931, the Zoo is one of the top visited attractions in the state of Utah and the number one paid tourist attraction in Salt Lake City. Spread out over 42 acres, its natural hillside terrain and meandering tree-covered pathways enhance the visitor experience as you discover the wonders of the natural world. Hours: 9:00 am – 6:30 pm

Sites to see nearby Salt Lake City (half or full day trips)

Antelope Island State Park:

Bison, Antelope, and brine shrimp—oh my. The cost is \$15 per car (up to 8 people inside) to drive across the causeway into the park. Many hiking trails (they are all exposed to the sun, so consider early morning or later afternoon/evening hikes in hotter months).

Silver Lake at Brighton:

Not a big hiker but still want to see nature? Silver Lake in the ski area of Brighton is at the top of Big Cottonwood Canyon. It's a beautiful drive and at the Lake there is a small nature exhibit and a boardwalk and easy, relatively flat trail that goes around the lake. Moose can frequently be seen here in the mornings and evenings. Check inside the nature center where they track wildlife sightings and learn about the area.

Park City:

Park City lies about 30 minutes up into the mountains east of Salt Lake City. Framed by the craggy Wasatch Range, it's bordered by the Deer Valley Resort and the huge Park City Mountain Resort, both known for their ski slopes. Utah Olympic Park, to the north, hosted the 2002 Winter Olympics and is now predominantly a training facility. In town, Main Street is lined with buildings built during a 19th-century silver mining boom.

Water lover? There is still something for you in the high desert:

- * Float in the Homestead Crater in Midway
- * Numerous hot springs around the region – Just google them.
- * Float on the super-salty Great Salt Lake (check the bug report before you go)

- * Paddleboard on East Canyon Reservoir or other watercraft-friendly bodies of water

Bonneville Salt Flats and Raceway:

The Bonneville Salt Flats are an other-worldly 30,000 acre expanse of hard, white salt crust on the western edge of the Great Salt Lake basin in Utah. The salt flats are about 12 miles long and 5 miles wide with total area coverage of just over 46 square miles. They are famous for the land-speed races that take place late in the summer and fall. Motor vehicle use is limited by seasonal closure during the spring when the salt is moist or has standing water on the surface. Closure dates may vary and will be posted by sign. Conditions are very harsh out on this landscape, so come prepared with lots of water, sunscreen, shady hats and sunglasses. It is about a 1 hr 45 minute drive west on I-80 to reach the flats from campus.

Need gear for your adventure? Rent from the U!

Outdoor Adventures, part of the University' Campus Recreation Services, can help. Since you are not paying university recreation fees, unfortunately, SVI students don't qualify for the 25% student/staff discount, however their rates are still very competitive. They have everything from camping gear, to paddle boards and boats, to bikes, to mountaineering gear.

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Frequently Asked Questions

Transferring University of Utah Credit

How can I transfer the Utah credits to my university?

- * You will need to look at your specific university's website under transferring credit. Be aware that it is different for each University so, if you are really unsure, even after looking at the website, we recommend calling your adviser.

How do I acquire my transcripts?

- * Transcripts can be acquired by an official request at the transcript office at the University of Utah. Ask your SVI Coordinator for directions to this office on campus.

Do Canadian students need a student visa to study in the US?

- * Canadian students are required to fill out the DS-2019 form which certifies eligibility for the J-1 visa (even though a physical visa is not required). The same documentation will need to be provided as international students.

Are the credits for the SVI only going to be offered through the University of Utah?

- * Yes, they are only offered through the University of Utah. However, we now have the option to list the courses on your transcript through either the Communication Sciences and Disorders department or the Music department. Please indicate which you would like to appear on your transcript on your SVI application and registration through the University of Utah.

Do I need to fill out a special form for graduate credit? Should I let my graduate advisor here at my university know about SVI?

- * All courses are listed as graduate credit on your transcript. No additional forms are necessary.
- * We recommend checking in with your university advisor to make sure they don't need any paperwork done and to make sure they will take the credit.

How are the courses assessed?

- * These are regular university graduate level courses and include grading on homework and exams. Final letter grades will be given at the end of each class.

Can I get a formal university transcript?

- * Yes, your final grade will appear on a formal University of Utah transcript. Upon completion of the course, you can request one from Utah. <https://registrar.utah.edu/transcripts/order-transcript.php>

Is a letter grade given to each block or is there just one grade for all of SVI?

- * There is a grade for each block, just like they would do for each class in a semester. They are basically normal summer classes.

Course Information

Can you give me a description for each course?

- * Principles of Voice Production: Basic physical, physiological, pedagogical principles in understanding professional, nonprofessional, impaired voice production; vocal anatomy, voice classification; control of loudness, pitch, register, quality; efficient, inefficient use of voice; instrumentation for voice analysis, synthesis.
- * Instrumentation for Voice Analysis, involves glottographic, videostroboscopic, electromyographic, and acoustic analysis for assessment of vocal and respiratory function; using these techniques in conjunction with perceptual evaluation of voice.
- * Habilitation is the application of methods of intervention in development, training, rehabilitation of vocal behavior; motor learning, efficacy of treatment strategies, factors affecting compliance with recommended therapy.
- * Voice for Performers: Comparison of Kinesthetic techniques for singing and acting voice; relaxation, posture, breathing, tone quality, diction, interpretation.

What is the schedule like for the classes?

- * Course 1 goes from 9:00 am to 12:30 pm. This usually includes two breaks (a half an hour for lunch and a 15min water break). Due to our newly condensed schedule in 2023, courses 2-4 will be a combination of morning and afternoon sessions as well as Saturday classes. Morning will generally be 9-12 and afternoon 1-4 or 4:30. Please refer to our more specific calendar as it is available.

What building and room will the classes held in?

- * With the exception of lab days, all classes will be held in the same building as our office on campus. This is the Performing Arts Building, aka PAB. The lecture room is room 103. Our administrative office is upstairs in room 206. Our building is conveniently right next door to the University Bookstore (which contains a Starbucks) as well as across from the Marriott Library and close to the Union building as well.

Am I allowed to record lectures for review?

- * Yes, unless the SVI Coordinator or the teacher specifies otherwise

How many days can I miss of SVI?

- * We cover so much information each day (about a week's information in one day) that it would be extremely hard to make up that time. In fact, we recommend that you miss 2 days or fewer.

Utah Tuition and Billing

Would students at SVI qualify for student loans?

- * If you are a current degree seeking student, you can qualify for a student loan. *In order to apply your student loans to the University of Utah, you must be a current degree seeking student at the University of Utah.* You may apply for this as an SVI student, but the process does take time so this must be completed long before SVI begins.

Is there a way to pay for SVI with my credit card?

- * Yes, this is the preferred payment method for the University of Utah. Housing will be paid through Utah Center for Vocology's UMarket Site (link to be provided) and Tuition is paid through the links provided to Continuing Education's registration site.

When do I pay tuition?

- * Tuition is due at the same time as you register for the courses. Since registration is accomplished through a direct link, payment will be required to complete the registration. See above section with registration/payment deadlines.

Is there any way I can pay my tuition in several payments?

- * The short answer is yes. You may complete the registration for each course at different times to spread out the payments. Just remember the deadlines for each registration as outlined earlier in this packet.

Do you send us a payment form, and are the class fees included in the total payment?

- * UCV does not send out any type of payment form. The tuition will be listed in the registration process.

Visas

I am currently under a J-1 VISA through my work; do I need another visa to study in the US?

- * You will just need to get approval to come from your school/program sponsor (as listed on your DS-2019).

I have a J-2 Visa; will it work for the SVI purposes?

- * A J-2 visa is accepted when studying in the U.S., so you are good to go.

I have a Type B1/B2 Visa; would that count for studying in the United States?

- * A B1/B2 visa will not work for our program. You will need to obtain a J-1 short term scholar visa or you will not be allowed, by the University of Utah, to participate in the program.

Instead of a Visa, could I use the Visa Waiver Program?

- * No. This doesn't include having to actually study and attend a university in the United States.

What is DS-2019 form for, and how can I get it?

- * The DS-2019 form is the certificate of eligibility for the SVI summer program. The application for this form will be sent to you by your SVI coordinator. Once the application is completed, it will be sent to the University of Utah International Office where they will generate the DS-2019 form. This form will be mailed to you and include your SEVIS number and U of U program number, which you will need to take to your visa appointment.

How do I prove that I can pay for my tuition on my DS-2019 form?

- * The University of Utah will accept personal or family banks statements, or letter of scholarship or grant provided by an additional source as proof of your ability to pay. Scholarship letters or grants must provide dates of eligibility if applicable.

How can I pay the Visa Application Fee?

- * The University of Utah International Student Services office charges us \$350 to process each DS-2019 form. SVI will pay for the initial processing, but the student is ultimately responsible for reimbursing SVI for this expense. Payment can be made on our [UMarket payment portal](#).

Miscellaneous

How do I get a University ID (UnID)?

- * The SVI coordinator will set up a UnID for you prior to your arrival. You will use this number as your University Email address. It will also be used to log in to online services like Canvas and CIS (Campus Information Services). Your initial password is your birthdate: mmddyy

Are students of SVI allowed to hire a coach/accompanist from University of Utah during studies?

- * Yes, just email your SVI Coordinator for more information or if you need any recommendations.

Would it be possible to defer/ re-apply for the course next year?

- * Yes, and you would not have to re-apply. You would just need to fill out another registration form for the year you will attend.

I would like to get a book from the University of Utah library; is that possible?

- * Yes! You will have a University of Utah student ID, so you will be able to check out books. The link to the Marriott Library is <http://www.lib.utah.edu/>.
- * Pro-tip---the Library has 3D printers and last year many students acquired files to print their own larynx models for a small printing fee.
